**Catholic Diocese of Jackson Statement**  
**Mississippi Court of Appeals Decision Affirming**  
**Dismissal of Abuse Claims Filed by Angie Phillips**

On July 18, 2003, Angie Phillips filed a lawsuit seeking \$12 million in damages from the Catholic Diocese of Jackson claiming that two different priests abused her beginning in 1972 and 1973. The Diocese of Jackson sought dismissal of her lawsuit because it was not filed within the time period allowed by law. On July 15, 2004, the trial court granted dismissal of the lawsuit finding that Ms. Phillips had not timely filed her cause of action. Ms. Phillips appealed that ruling. The Mississippi Court of Appeals affirmed the trial court's dismissal. Today, the Court of Appeals specifically rejected Ms. Phillip's assertion that the time period for filing a lawsuit be tolled. In its ruling, the appeals court confirmed that Ms. Phillips failed to provide evidence that the Catholic Diocese engaged in any conduct to conceal the alleged abuse or that it otherwise engaged in conduct that would have prevented her from discovering that she might have a lawsuit against the diocese.

The diocese believes that the trial court and the Mississippi Court of Appeals were correct in applying a judicial time limit to these actions. Bishop Joseph Latino and the Diocese of Jackson are pleased with today's ruling but are ever mindful of those who have suffered from abuse by priests or others. Our thoughts and prayers go out to those victims.

We urge anyone who has been a victim of abuse by church personnel, who has not yet reported the abuse, to come forward and do so.
